

VETS TO BE AIDED BY LEGION, O'BRIEN SAYS AT UNWEILING

Three Memorials to 1500 Dedicated in Fairview, Moorestown, Lenola

The American Legion is prepared to serve the men and women of the armed forces when they come home after the war, Thomas J. O'Brien, county commander, said yesterday.

O'Brien was one of the principal speakers at the unveiling of an honor roll erected in Yorkship Square by the United Memorial Association of Fairview as tribute to 500 serving from that section of the city.

Similar events were held in Oaklyn, Moorestown and Lenola. In all events parades and patriotic exercises marked the tributes to those who have given their lives and others in the armed forces.

Pleads for Jobs

O'Brien urged people to remember what happened after the last war when ex-soldiers sold apples on the street. He pleaded for them to be given jobs when they come home.

Mayor Brunner said the neighborhood youngsters of yesterday are bearing the brunt in this war and he urged the several hundred in the audience to buy war loan bonds and stamps until it hurts.

City Commissioner Gotshalk accepted the plans of the association for the monument and sealed the box in the courthouse. Another speaker was Commander C. R. Flint, chaplain, U. S. Navy.

Burnell S. Hartman, Fairview Post American Legion, presided at ceremonies at the monument, which is partially completed. During the exercises O'Brien presented a certificate of appreciation to the architect, W. K. Albert. Jean Temple, niece of a gold star mother, Mrs. William Gradwell, unveiled it.

Four Gold Stars

In addition to the 500 names on the honor roll there are four gold stars for men who have given their lives. Gold Star mothers were presented with flowers by Mayor Brunner. They were Mrs. Gradwell, 278 Constitution road, mother of Pvt. William Gradwell, Jr. who was killed in a train wreck in Porto Rico; Mrs. Mary Latin, 233 Constitution road, mother of John Sullivan, killed in action; Mrs. Charles Bruns, 3027 Tuckahoe road, mother of Charles, Jr. who died of a sunstroke in camp; and Mrs. Charles R. Brant, 3048 Constitution road, grandmother of Pvt. Charles M. Smith, killed in action.

Selections were rendered at the monument by the Yorkship School Band. Singing was led by Mrs. Jean Temple. The program opened with a melody of George M. Cohan's patriotic selections.

Preceding the exercises at the monument a street parade formed at the American Legion Hall, Black Horse Pike and Collings avenue,

ceremonies. Rev. W. J. Sayre, pastor of First Methodist church, was guest speaker. He urged the audience to "praise God and pass the mail to our servicemen and women as the means of strengthening them."

Rev. Sayre added that the war penalties "support God's purposes," and advised everyone to "match the courage and sacrifices of the armed forces with skill and labor at home."

Gold Star Mothers Assist

The roll, containing 800 names, was unveiled by four Gold Star mothers and Mrs. Joseph Madden, president of the Servicemen's Mothers Club of Moorestown township. The mothers are Mrs. Wesley Bishop, Mrs. Lena Eramson, Mrs. Brookway Inman and Mrs. Edward Gronz.

Jonathan W. Powell, president of the Burlington County Trust Company, was master of ceremonies. Invocation was given by Rev. V. F. Griggs, pastor of Second Baptist church, and benediction by Rev. Edward A. Cahill, rector of Our Lady of Good Council church. Dr. Howard Curtis led group singing.

Lenola Honors 150

A. Matlack Stackhouse, former assemblyman, was principal speaker at the services in Lenola when a roll with 150 names was unveiled.

Stackhouse declared the present generation is facing "with the humility and grace the responsibilities thrust upon them—it is to them the veterans of the first World War, who are still holding on to the fringes of the ideals for which they fought, are looking for the accomplishment of those ideals."

5 HURT, 5 VEHICLES SMASHED IN CRASH

Car Sets Bridgeboro House Afire; Accident Due to Intersection Wreck

Bridgeboro, Nov. 7.—Not until noon yesterday had police straightened out the details of an accident which within 10 minutes on Saturday afternoon caused the following:

Injured five persons, one critically.

Damaged two automobiles, two trucks and a fire engine.

Wrecked the front porch of a Bridgeboro home.

Fired one car and caused summoning of firemen in turn as it burned against the porch.

"It only took 30 minutes to happen but a day and a half to investigate and get the facts of the thing straight," said Bridgeboro state police. "It was a study in cause and effect, but we finally got it straight."
